



The 10x Developer's Security Checklist

Security isn't an afterthought; it's a habit. Use this checklist before every commit and deployment to keep your secrets safe.

Phase 1: Local Environment

Gitignore Check

Verify .env added to .gitignore

Prevents sensitive environment variables from being accidentally committed

Global Ignore

Configure global .gitignore for system files

System-specific files like .DS_Store shouldn't be tracked in any project

No Hardcoding

Scan for "sk_live", "api_key", "password"

Hardcoded secrets in code are easily exposed through reviews or breaches

Local Variables

Use .env.local for personal overrides

Allows personal API keys without affecting shared configuration

</> Phase 2: Git & Version Control

Pre-commit Hooks

trufflehog · git-secrets · Block secrets from commits

Automatically scan code for secrets before each commit, preventing accidental exposure

History Scan

Old repos · History audit · Past commits

Old repositories may contain secrets committed years ago that still pose security risks

Repo Visibility

Public vs. Private · Repository settings · Access control

Public repositories are accessible to anyone, while private ones restrict access

Phase 3: Deployment & Docker

Docker Cleanliness

COPY . . . Secrets in images · .dockerignore

Using COPY . . . in Dockerfiles can inadvertently include sensitive files like .env

Runtime Injection

AWS Secrets Manager · Environment variables · Build vs Runtime

Injecting secrets at runtime prevents them from being stored in container images

Container User

Non-root · USER directive · Principle of least privilege

Running containers as root increases security risks; non-root users limit potential damage

Phase 4: Maintenance

Rotation Schedule

90 days · Calendar reminder · API keys

Regular key rotation limits the damage potential of compromised keys

Least Privilege

Database users · Permissions audit · Minimal access

Granting only necessary permissions reduces the impact of potential breaches

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
